**Location:** Virtual Residency Program

**Description:** The Mellon Humanities PhD Interventions Project will support up to **10** doctoral students' participation in a five-day Virtual Graduate Student Summer Residency. The theme for this residency is [Meaning Teaching and Learning in the Humanities Classroom](#). This program will model best practices for undergraduate teaching that can be modified for face-to-face, virtual, or hybrid instruction. Focusing on the process of translating research into practice, students are given guidance on how to create meaningful learning experiences for any level audience in sessions led by prominent scholars, master educators, and technology experts. Most importantly, the design of the residency requires direct and collegial work among students from different universities and disciplines, creating a much richer network of humanities professionals.

- CV
- Brief letter of application detailing your year, stage of PhD program, area of focus, and your reasons for wanting to attend this program. Due to limited space, you may only choose one program for which you may be considered. Max 1.5 pages, single spaced.
- Email approval of your plan to attend this program from your faculty advisor (if you have one) **and** your DGS.
- We recommend that you send one email to your advisor and DGS, and copy [LGS.profdev@emory.edu](mailto:LGS.profdev@emory.edu). The faculty can simply hit reply to convey their approval of your plan. **Note: They do not have to write letters. A simple acknowledgement and support of this plan will suffice. The faculty approval(s) must be received no later than Monday, April 5.**

Successful applicants will receive a tuition scholarship that covers all the programming for the NHC Graduate Student Summer Residency Program. Once the residencies have been completed all participants are required to submit a final report (details to be provided).
