Interested in expanding your teaching portfolio and receiving additional pedagogical training and experience in writing instruction? The Emory College Writing Program, in partnership with LGS, is now opening enrollment for **ENG 791 Composition Pedagogy**.

Students who have completed ENG 791 will be qualified to teach ENGRD 101 (Rhetorical Composition and Critical Reading) in a subsequent semester. These themed first-year writing courses teach academic writing and genres of writing in various fields.

## Benefits

- **Pedagogical training** with a focus on writing instruction – this three-credit semester-long graduate class will be noted on your transcript.
- **Hands-on mentorship** – you will teach a micro composition lesson under supervision of an experienced writing teacher.
- **Syllabus development** – draft, test, and revise a syllabus for your own themed undergraduate writing class, with feedback from writing/rhetoric specialists.
- **Being the instructor** of record for a first-year composition class of 16 students.

## Compensation

For teaching a section of ENGRD 101 in the following semester, you will *either*:

- Receive \$3000-\$3500, *or*
  - Fulfill the TATTO 610 requirement
- \* *Enrollment in ENG 791 is not compensated.*
